
## Partnership for Sustainable Textiles

Network and support for social and ecological textile supply chains

## A strong multi-stakeholder initiative



The Partnership for Sustainable Textiles (PST) is a multistakeholder initiative committed to a social, ecological and corruption-free textile and garment industry — an industry that respects the rights of all workers, that protects the climate and the environment, and operates with integrity and within planetary boundaries. The Textiles Partnership aligns its work with international agreements and guidelines (e.g. OECD, UN, ILO) that define the principles of social, environmental, and economic sustainability and set the framework for corporate responsibility. The PST emphasises the implementation of corporate due diligence and responsible business conduct in Germany, Europe and worldwide.



### International cooperation

The PST cooperates with European and international initiatives and organisations to share best practices, harmonise requirements and processes, increase leverage for engagement and avoid duplication.



#### OAR cooperation & aggregated supplier list

As transparency is a prerequisite for the implementation of due diligence, the Textiles Partnership and the Open Apparel Registry (OAR) started a strategic cooperation in 2020. The OAR is an open-source tool that maps textile production sites around the world and assigns them a unique identification number. The PST has published an aggregated list with a total of around 8.500 production sites from 23 member companies on the OAR platform.

From 2023, it will be mandatory for all PST member companies to publish their tier-1 suppliers via the aggregated



On November 2, the Open Apparel Registry was expanded to become the Open Supply Hub. The new tool maps retail supply chains more broadly, including cosmetics, consumer goods, electronics, furniture, sporting goods and, of course, apparel.


## Dialogue & (peer) learning

In Partnership Initiatives and joint projects, members join forces to achieve better results and more impact for people and the environment in production countries.



#### Recyclable product clones

9 PST member companies participated in a project that aimed at creating more sustainable product upgrades. They nominated 10 of their products and had them analysed by the Niederrhein University with regard to recyclability, longevity and material purity.

The project resulted in various creative and innovative solutions: Regarding the backpack from Deuter, for example, the use of materials could be further minimised when unnecessary seams and parts were replaced.



#### Best practice for modularity

In the case of hiking pants from Ortovox, inner and outer trousers are held together by a belt, but can be easily separated from each other for washing or repairing.

GLOBAL SOLIDARITY



The Initiative for Global Solidarity (IGS) promotes the implementation of human rights and environmental due diligence in global supply chains. It scales and harmonises approaches that have proven their worth. The IGS supports buying and supplying companies in the textile and electronics sector in implementing their shared responsibility for the impact of their business practices on people and the planet. The four areas of action are:

- Models of shared responsibility on e.g. responsible purchasing practices, substitution coal-fired boilers
- Data and Transparency for example by supporting the "Open Supply Hub"
- Responsible Business Hubs: local helpdesks in Bangladesh, Cambodia, Serbia, Vietnam
- Complaints mechanisms; 125,000 workers are to be given access to effective complaints mechanisms, 75,000 of them women. Gender-based violence and discrimination will be given special attention.
